### The fall of the Berlin Wall

On November 9, 1989, the spokesman for East Berlin's Communist Party announced that citizens of the GDR would be able to cross the border to West Berlin starting at midnight that night. More than two million East Berliners crossed the border that weekend. On October 3, 1990, Berlin was officially reunified.



#### Why was it built?

Between 1949 and 1961, an estimated 2.7 million people left the GDR and East Berlin, many of them young skilled workers. On August 12, 1961 the GDR Council announced that they would be building a wall to separate East and West Berlin - not to keep the West out, but to keep the East in.

#### Escaping East Berlin

More than 5,000 East Germans were able to sneak across the border into West Berlin via secretunnels, jumping out of windows driving through the wall at high speeds, etc.

#### Building the Wall

Following this announcement, construction began immediately.

Streets, neighborhoods, and transport lines were completely severed by the Wall. Homes along the wall route were incorporated into the wall itself – someone's front door could be in the East and their back door in the West.

## Crossing the border

Diplomats and other officials
were screened to enter or leave,
but normal travelers were rarely
allowed to move between sides.
At least 170 people were killed by
the GDR trying to cross from East
to West Berlin
