Course Objective:

This course is designed to provide music education students with knowledge and practical skills that will allow them to successfully teach music through performance in orchestra. The theoretical component of the course will cover the history of string instruments and orchestra education in the US, in addition to the insights on how to direct successful orchestra programs including the tips on recruitment, advocacy, and use of technology. The practical component of the course will provide students with insights into how to teach orchestra instruments in group settings at all three levels of skill development: the beginning, intermediate, and advanced levels. Additionally, the course will provide students with knowledge and skills needed for conducting successful rehearsals along with the tips for selecting, analyzing, and preparing

orchestra music for the purpose of teaching it to school aged students. Field experience consisting of observing successful music educators in local school district as well as observing teachers in String Projects will make learning in this course more complete and related to the real world settings.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Students will demonstrate knowledge and skills needed for teaching foundational, intermediate, and advanced playing techniques to string students at three levels of schooling (elementary, middle, and high school), while using varied sound string pedagogy approaches/methods.

Students will demonstrate the knowledge of content of major method books for teaching strings in group settings at three levels of schooling (elementary, middle, and high school).

Students will demonstrate the knowledge of repertoire for school orchestras at three levels of schooling (elementary, middle, and high school) and will be able to analyze musical score for teaching purposes.

Students will demonstrate that they can play and teach at least one piece of music on their primary or secondary string instrument in solo setting.

Students will be able to write in-depth observations of field experiences reflecting on classroom management aspects of observed classes and useful teaching moments they observed.
